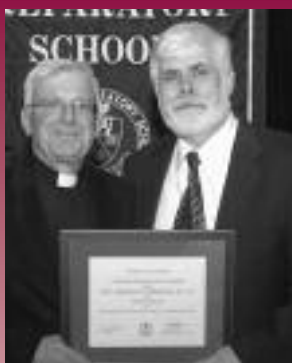

2009 Hall of Honor Dinner

The science and classroom facilities which we dedicated with style thanks to Joe Bastianich '85 and his crew from Becco restaurant have given a real shot in the arm to our talented science department. Since they no longer have to share space with several teachers and there are computers at each station, the teachers are engaging the students in more sophisticated and in-depth laboratory experiments. The students are thus more deeply involved in their science learning. Enthusiasm for science is at an all time high.

realization that this is not just an abstract policy issue but a lived reality in our community.

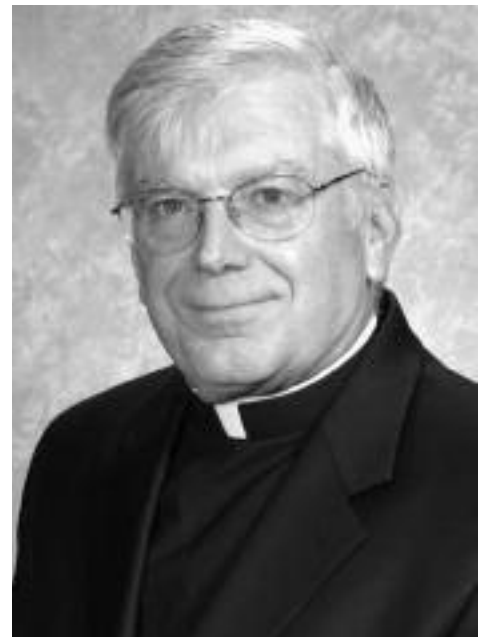
We continue to welcome and serve the young men whose families have journeyed from five continents in search of a better life for their sons. We continue to be enriched by the varied traditions these young men share with our family.

From the Principal's Desk



Ken Boller points out in his article above that 29% of the Prep students have at least one parent who is foreign-born. Our records indicate that this has been the tradition back into the mid 1900's. It may go back even further but documentation is incomplete. Over the years, the list of countries has broadened, but the challenges of immigration have been part of the lives of many Prep families for a very long time. Today at the Prep, we discuss immigration within the larger framework of social justice. The Catholic Church and the Society of Jesus in particular, are at

the forefront of efforts to champion principles of social justice.

Our students study Catholic social teaching from the time they are freshmen. They grow in the understanding of their personal responsibility to serve others through curriculum, assemblies, special events, other efforts which focus on various social justice issues, and our well-articulated Service Program. In addition, we have decided to choose one significant social justice issue and spend a year or more educating the Prep community, having special presentations, and giving students and faculty opportunities to work as activists for change. We chose immigration as our first topic due to the nature of our community and the national discourse on the issue. Our Social Justice committee has met regularly for almost a year, often bringing in experienced consultants such as Fr. Brian Jordan, O.F.M., founder of the Holy Name Province Labor-Immigration Project and Fr. Mark Hallinan, S.J., Assistant for Social Ministries for the New York Province of the Society of Jesus. Its efforts have led to a coordinated series of activities to help hone our understanding of immigration issues and to involve our community in the struggle for justice.

The committee's efforts have led to special presentations to our sophomores and freshmen, articles in our two news publications, *Ramview* and *The Objective*, and discussions on our Campus Ministry Boards to apply the principles of Catholic Social Teaching to immigration questions. (Our Campus Ministry Boards are made up of 130 students from sophomore, junior, and senior year who meet weekly for personal spiritual development and to plan various ministry events) The Prep has also joined the Ignatian Solidarity Network (ISN), a national organization which promotes communication, education, social justice awareness and action among Jesuit institutions. Eight students and four teachers traveled to the ISN Teach-in on Immigration in Washington, D.C. for a series of keynotes and presentations to help them understand the issues and to get training in how to work for change. These students and teachers lobbied in Washington with aides for Senator Schumer and Congressman Serrano on the need for immigration reform, presented the necessity for comprehensive immigration reform to various grade levels

back at the Prep, and recruited upwards of 65 students and faculty to join the Church's campaign on immigration reform. They also joined with our Social Justice Committee to organize a school assembly in December. During the assembly, the school watched one video prepared by a Prep teacher whose family consisted of relatively recent immigrants. It detailed their story including their contributions and their pride in America. A second video presented the story of a staff member, himself an immigrant, and his struggles to come this country. And, a student presented the story of his father who immigrated from Ireland and has worked to give his family a good life in this country. Jill Gershutz, from the Social and International Ministries office of the Jesuit Conference, then addressed the school.

At the assembly's conclusion, I mentioned Theodore Cardinal McCarrick, the retired archbishop of Washington, D.C. who has been one of the Church's strongest advocates for justice for immigrants. Cardinal McCarrick graduated from Fordham Prep in 1949. Although recognized as someone whose own commitment to social justice and our shared obligation to care for the poor is outstanding, Cardinal McCarrick has pointed out that his entire family is filled with heroes and heroines who truly personify these characteristics. He described them as folks who came from Ireland with nothing, and who worked and studied and struggled for a new life while, during that struggle, never forgetting to help their neighbor. In a recent speech following his testimony to a Congressional Committee on Immigration, Cardinal McCarrick spoke words to the Committee that I quoted because they fit so perfectly.

"In closing, I would like to encourage you to continue your efforts to help immigrants and others who come to our land. If you are new to this mission, I pray that this meeting will inspire you to become involved... Just a few years ago... I was asked how I could be optimistic of success in the light of the political divisions in our country. The press event was ending and there was no time for a detailed reply, so I simply answered in Spanish. "Hay que sonar" – one has to dream. That is no longer an acceptable response. This time we must do more. We have to change what is broken, otherwise more people will suffer. We have to be courageous and persistent and change the system. The time of dreaming is over, the new day calls to work for change. In the end, by opening the door to the stranger, we are opening the door to Christ in our lives."

I pointed out that when Father Boller spoke at the beginning of the assembly, it was obvious that all of us have immigrant roots. And, our families have their own heroes and heroines who came to America for a new life and never forgot to help their neighbors. It is our responsibility to follow in their footsteps and to work together for reform that is fair and just, and that respects the rights and dignity of all immigrants and other members of our society.

Our efforts at the Prep to inform ourselves about immigration will continue into next year. Our endeavors to generate understanding and commitment within our community to bring the principles of Catholic Social Teaching to bear on social issues will continue forever. This is one of the important legacies left us by Ignatius of Loyola.

Ways of Making Gifts for Scholarships and Financial Aid

From the Chaplain

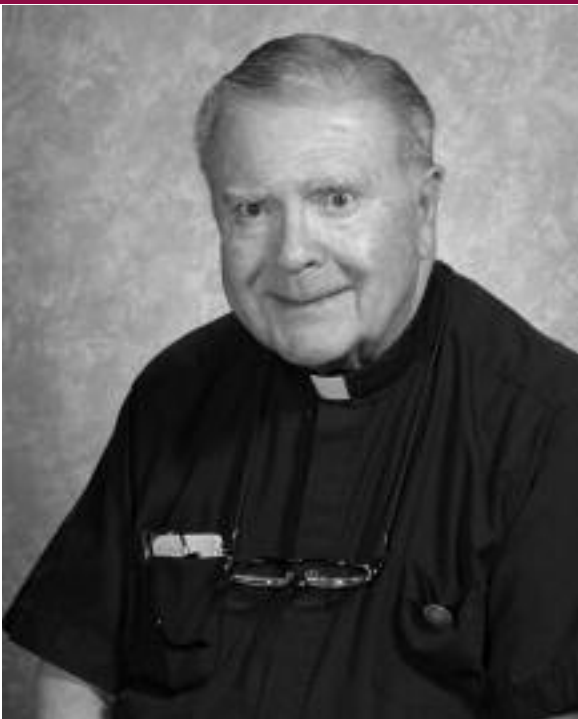
Fr. Don Devine, S.J.

I graduated from another Jesuit high school in 1951 before joining the Jesuits. From 1959-79, I was involved as a teacher, department head and chaplain in metropolitan area Jesuit schools and then as principal at Canisius high school in Buffalo. Later I was superintendent of NY Jesuit high schools from 1979-84. After serving as President of Xavier in Truk, I moved to McQuaid in Rochester until 1988 when I was assigned to 15 years at Loyola retreat house in Morristown, NJ and parish ministry in Buffalo.

As a younger Jesuit, I had certain dreams – a progressive program of retreats for students in our high schools, an ongoing exposure and involvement of our students in service opportunities to less fortunate individuals and minorities both in school and outside the building in local communities, more active participation by all staff members in our Ignatian vision through personal prayer and religious involvement forming young men who were concerned about and committed to serving others after graduation.

I have been amazed after 20 years away from Jesuit secondary schools to discover that what I thought were ‘impossible dreams’ have become realities. It’s exciting in one’s seventies to discover that our schools have become even better Jesuit schools than we experienced in our days of happy memory. Surprising, probably! Unlikely, yes! Impossible, no! It’s happening!

I’m happy and proud to be at Fordham Prep as faculty chaplain. 10 PRINCIPLES OF

Human Dignity

The Catholic Church proclaims that human life is sacred and that the dignity of the person is at the core of a moral vision for society. Our belief in the sanctity of human life and the inherent dignity of the human person is the foundation of all the principles of our social teaching.

Community and the Common Good

In a global culture driven by excessive individualism, our tradition proclaims that the person is not only sacred but also social. How we organize our society – in economics and politics, in law and policy – directly affects human dignity and the capacity of individuals to grow in community. Our Church teaches that the role of the government and other institutions is to protect human life and human dignity and promote the common good.

Rights and Responsibilities

Catholic tradition teaches that human dignity can be protected and a healthy community can be achieved only if human rights are protected and responsibilities are met. Therefore, every person has a fundamental right to life and a right to those things required for human decency. Corresponding to these rights are duties and responsibilities – to one another, to our families, and to the larger society.

Options for the Poor and Vulnerable

Catholic teaching proclaims that a basic moral test is how our most vulnerable members are faring. In a society marred by deepening divisions between rich and poor, our tradition recalls the story of the Last Judgment (Mt. 25) and instructs us to put the needs of the poor and vulnerable first.

Participation

All people have a right to participate in the economic, political, and cultural life of society. It is a fundamental demand of justice and a requirement for human dignity that all people be assured a minimum level of participation in the community. Conversely, it is wrong for a person or a group to be excluded unfairly or to be unable to participate in society. In the words of the U.S. bishops, “The ultimate injustice is for a person or group to be treated actively or abandoned passively as if they were non-members of the human race. To treat people this way is effectively to say they simply do not count as human beings.”

The Sophomore Campus Ministry Board

Explores Catholic Social Teaching

In the 1998 document “Sharing Catholic Social Teaching: Challenges and Directions” the US Catholic Bishops said the following: “Far too many Catholics are not familiar with the basic content of Catholic social teaching. More fundamentally, many Catholics do not adequately understand that the social teaching of the Church is an essential part of Catholic faith. This poses a serious challenge for all Catholics, since it weakens our capacity to be a Church that is true to the demands of the Gospel. We need to do more to share the social mission and message of our Church.

The values of the Church’s social teaching must not be treated as tangential or optional. They must be a core part of teaching and formation. Without our social teaching, schools, catechetical programs, and other formation programs would be offering an incomplete presentation of our Catholic tradition. This would fall short of our mission and would be a serious loss for those in our educational and catechetical programs.”

Jesuit Schools have long been at the forefront of educating students about the Social Mission of the Church as we seek to help young people to develop as men “Committed to Justice.” The Prep’s efforts to familiarize students with this have taken many forms in the past few years. The Immigration Committee, comprised of both faculty and students, has participated in a national teach-in and helped the Prep community to understand the issue through the lens of Catholic Social Teaching through a variety of assemblies. This past fall Jim Keady, founder of Educating for Justice, addressed the sophomore class about his work to end the use of sweatshop labor by major clothing manufacturers. This spring a group of students will travel to Wheeling, West Virginia for the Ignatian Family Spring Teach-IN on Environmental Justice and Sustainability.

Many of the student leaders at the forefront of these issues come from our Campus Ministry Board where they are first exposed to Catholic Social Teaching in a formal way in sophomore year. As part of their weekly meeting they explore the ten principles of Catholic Social teaching and then try to apply them to contemporary social issues. This understanding of Catholic Social Teaching becomes the foundation for engaging the students in projects that promote justice. The hope is that this is the start of a life-long commitment to promoting justice as an essential part of living out their faith.

CATHOLIC SOCIAL TEACHING

Dignity of Work and Rights of Workers

In a marketplace where too often the quarterly bottom line takes precedence over the rights of workers, we believe that the economy must serve people, not the other way around. If the dignity of work is to be protected, then the basic rights of workers must be respected – the right to productive work, to decent and fair wages, to organize and join unions, to private property and to economic initiative.

Stewardship of Creation

Catholic tradition insists that we show our respect for the Creator by our stewardship of creation. We are called to protect people and the planet, living our faith in relationship with all of God’s creation. This environmental challenge has fundamental moral and ethical dimensions which cannot be ignored.

Solidarity

Catholic social teaching proclaims that we are our brothers’ and sisters’ keepers, wherever they live. We are one human family, whatever our national, racial, ethnic, economic, and ideological differences. Solidarity means that “loving our neighbor” has global dimensions in an interdependent world.

Role of Government

Because we are social beings, the state is natural to the person. Therefore, the state has a positive moral function. It is an instrument to promote human dignity, protect human rights, and build the common good. Its purpose is to assist citizens in fulfilling their responsibility to others in society. Since, in a large and complex society these responsibilities cannot adequately be carried out on a one-to-one basis, citizens need the help of government in fulfilling these responsibilities and promoting the common good.

Promotion of Peace

Catholic teaching promotes peace as a positive, action-oriented concept. In the words of Pope John Paul II, “Peace is not just the absence of war. It involves mutual respect and confidence between peoples and nations. It involves collaboration and binding agreements. There is a close relationship in Catholic teaching between peace and justice. Peace is the fruit of justice and is dependent upon right order among human beings.

The Prep faculty gathered in the Commons on Saturday, October 17, 2009 for the annual faculty dinner.

Father John Leonard, S.J. became the first faculty member to receive the triple Bene Merenti medal for his sixty years of service to the Prep community.

Father Mallick Fitzpatrick was honored for his fifty years of service to the Prep.

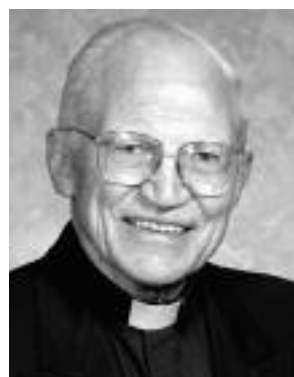

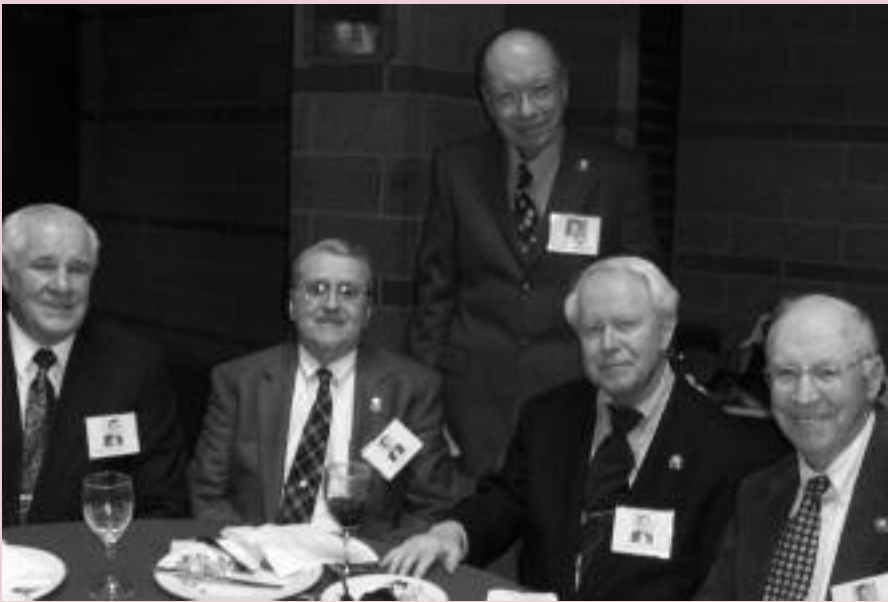

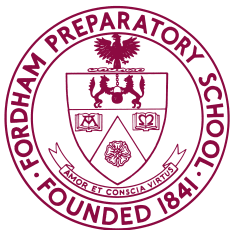
