Honor Inductees The 2011





The Return of Cardboard City Night

On Tuesday, May 17th, 41 Fordham Prep students and four faculty members spent a rain soaked evening sleeping outside of the Prep in cardboard boxes. The event was dubbed "The Return of Cardboard City Night," by Mr. Viele's freshman mentor group. Mr. Viele fondly remembered participating in the event as a student during his junior and senior year. When it came time for his mentor group to put together their freshman service project he suggested they bring back the event. Prior to this year, the night had not occurred since 2005.

The evening started at the Prep at 7:00 p.m. Students gathered in the Commons to prepare their boxes for the evening. After preparing their boxes, students assembled in the Leonard Theater for a talk from Father Ned Murphy. Father Ned founded Part of the Solution, a soup kitchen which is a stones throw away from the Prep,

on Webster Avenue. He told them about his mission to help the homeless get off the streets and answered all of the questions the students had. Father Ned also encouraged them to volunteer their time after school.

After the talk, students were served a meal consisting of soup and bread by Ms. Gavin, Mr. Phipps and Mr. Hemsley. Once dinner was over students put some finishing touches on the boxes, then headed back to the theater to view the documentary, *The Human Experience*.

The Human Experience, is an award winning documentary about an altruistic group of young men who set to seek out the true human spirit by visiting a group of homeless New Yorkers, Peruvian orphans and isolated Ghanian lepers. The documentary was thought provoking and afterwards

Mr. Phipps led a lively discussion about the film and students' overall thoughts on cardboard city night.

The highlight of the evening occurred shortly after 12:00 a.m. After a prayer and reflection, students brought their homes for the night outside the front doors of the Prep. Due to the downpour, plans to sleep on the back field were nixed, and students instead placed their boxes under the front overhangs. A few brave students wrapped their boxes in garbage bags and pushed the boxes out into the rain. At the 6:00 a.m. wakeup call, the students had survived the cool night, downpour and a rather unpleasant rat encounter. They had also raised awareness of the overwhelming issue of homelessness in America and came to the realization of just how fortunate they truly are.








The Chaplain's Corner:

Many good people are troubled by their human, hesitant responses to God's many invitations to become more un-selfish, joyfully generous followers of Jesus. They are humble, sincere, good people who want to get to know Jesus and themselves better, to become better people by using their talents well.

Unfortunately, all too many of them focused on their failings, their imperfections, their inadequacies, their failures. As a priest, I feel one of my major challenges is to help people see, love and forgive themselves as Jesus does. Jesus does not withhold His love until we reach a certain level of holiness. He loves us as we are now, warts and wrinkles and jowls and all. And He wants us to do the same, to accept the fact that we are good enough for now. Is there room for growth, need for improvement, are



there habits to change? Of course! We are not perfect, we have new challenges to face, we always need to strive to become more loving, grateful and forgiving. 

From the President's Office



that. Just this year we were able to bring back rugby with tremendous support and encouragement from the Xavier Rugby organization.

In November, we will induct another class into the Hall of Honor at a dinner at The New York Botanical Garden. We are happy to celebrate the outstanding accomplishments of these men and the Sisters of Charity who have contributed so much to the Prep and our world by their lives of dedication and service. We are justly proud of their accomplishments and delighted to present them to our current students as models of greatness to be imitated and surpassed.

From the Principal's Desk

On May 25, at the 166th Fordham Prep Commencement Exercises for the class of 2011, Mr. John J. Folev '63 was the speaker. Jack has taught Classical Languages at the Prep since 1968 and is the Department Chairperson. It is unusual for a faculty member to be chosen as the graduation speaker, but Jack was certainly up to the challenge. He presented the seniors with a thoughtful and insightful explication of the Jesuit education in which they had participated for the last four years of their lives.

After his address, Fr. Boller and I,

on behalf of Fordham University President Fr. Joseph McShane, S.J., presented Jack with the University's President's Award. The citation, in part, read:


The study of Latin and Greek was integral to the education offered in the first and second divisions of St. John's College (now Fordham University) when it was founded in 1841. For more than 40 years, John "Jack" Foley has been a loyal successor to that storied history of teaching Latin and Greek at Rose Hill. Since joining the faculty of Fordham Prep in 1968, he has been a world class tour guide for thousands of young men sailing with Ascanius and Anchises away from a burning Troy and back home again over Homer's wine-dark sea.

As a poised and patient chair of the Classics Department, he recruited a gifted faculty, provided a model for quality teaching, mentored many along their journey, and navigated the study of classics back to its former position of honor and prestige.

As one whose deeds truly exemplify what it means to be a man for others, Fordham University is proud to honor him today with the President's Award.


At this point in its history, the Prep generates extraordinary interest from potential students and enthusiasm and support from our own students, their parents, and our alumni. Our reputation, location, diversity, and explosion of sports success all contribute to this popularity. But, at top of this list is a talented, committed faculty who provide a quality education in a challenging and caring manner. They love what they do, they are very good at it, and they create a climate where Ignatian Spirituality flourishes and freshmen grow into young men of competence, conscience and compassion. Within this gifted group of men and women, Jack Foley is one of the best.

This reminds me of two separate conversations I have had recently with adults who have limited connections to Fordham Prep. Neither attended Fordham nor have children who attended. Both gentlemen are professionals and have relationships with a number of clients who attended the Prep. The first spoke of the extraordinary enthusiasm he has observed in his work and in his community from anyone connected to Fordham Prep. Parents and students alike speak with fervor and love about the school. The other, a



non-Christian, was particularly fascinated about the culture and spirituality of the Prep. He, too, mentioned the overwhelming positive reaction of colleagues and clients who graduated from the Prep or whose children attended the school. He described some of these graduates and noted that they were varied in their own work and personalities, yet they seemed to him to share some common denominator. They were all intelligent, had analytical skills, and had strength of character.

These conversations suggest to me that Jack Foley's description of the underlying philosophy of Fordham Prep and other Jesuit high schools is having a profound impact. When a school embraces the spirituality and philosophy of Ignatius of Loyola, and does so with faculty members who are as dedicated, gifted and committed as Jack Foley, the results are almost miraculous.

Rev. John J. Halligan, S.J. '47 Father Halligan joined the Jesuit



order after graduating from the Prep. In 1964, his Jesuit Superior asked him to study and report back to him about the street children of Quito,

Ecuador. This report lead to Father founding the Working Boys Center which provides meals and education and a place to stay for the boys in the program. His work on the Working Boys Center has received international acclaim.

Bob was a long time member of the Prep faculty and Prep and Fordham University coaching staffs. Former students and team members remember

his skills as a teacher and coach but for most of them Bob left an even stronger impression with his generosity, integrity, humanity and penchants for hard work, respect for others, fair play and living as a gentleman.

Archbishop John Hughes



Archbishop Hughes is the founder of St. John's College, which later divided into Fordham University and Fordham Preparatory

School. A strong believer in education, he played a prominent role in developing the New York Archdiocese Catholic school system.

George A. Jackson '76



In George's obituary, it was noted that he went "from Harlem to Harvard to Hollywood." He was a devoted Prep alumnus who served on

the Board of Trustees and spoke at the Father-Son Communion Breakfast and one of the Prep's graduations. Professionally, he was a film producer who later became President and CEO of Motown Records.

all distinguished themselves as members of the military during the Civil War.



The Sisters of Charity



The first women to enter the Fordham Prep Hall of Honor were, literally, the first women at the school now known as Fordham Prep. In 1841, when

Archbishop Hughes established St. John's College, he asked the Sisters of Charity to run the infirmary and to take charge of the cooking and cleaning duties at the new school.

August Stellwag '49



Gus Stellwag turned down admission to Regis High School to attend Fordham Prep. His dedication to the Prep since 1945 is unquestioned.

Besides serving as the Prep's librarian and archivist, he served, along with Frank Holbrook '45, as author of When September Comes that was published in 1991. His classmates credit him with being the glue that holds their class together.

Rev. Charles S. Sullivan, S.J.



In his 41 years at the Prep, Father Sullivan has served as teacher, coach, retreat director and athletic director. In his classroom and on the basketball

court, Father Sullivan always demanded the best of students and players. He has worked with the junior year Emmaus program since its inception in 1985 often serving as retreat director. He leads a group of alumni and current students as part of the annual Prep Habitat for Humanity projects.

James J. Walsh 1880



After his Prep graduation, James Walsh went on to Fordham University and the University of Pennsylvania where he received his

medical degree. He returned to Rose Hill in 1907 to serve as Acting Dean and Professor of Nervous Diseases at the newly opened Medical School of Fordham University. He is the founder of the Fordham University Press, the oldest Catholic University press in America.



We all knew him as Sammy. It was a nickname he picked up playing high school football because his style resembled that of "Slinging Sammy Baugh" the quarterback for the Washington Redskins in the 1930's and 40's. His real name was Joe Ososki ... the Joe Ososki who played in the backfield for Fordham College in the famous 1942 Sugar Bowl game. His college career was interrupted by World War Two. As a Marine he earned distinction in the Battle of Iowa Jima. He then returned to Fordham, played one more year and finished in 1947. Upon graduation, he was drafted by the New York Giants. His profootball career ended quickly with a training camp knee injury. Joe became a scout for the Giants and also found time to coach at Fordham. He married and had two children. In the early 1950's, Fordham College started to close down its football program and finally ended it in 1954. Sammy moved across the Bronx campus to Fordham Prep and became the High School varsity football coach.

On Day One in 1954, he held a meeting with his new football team on the practice field. He stood in front of us. He was olive complected. Some say that his face looked like smooth leather. His dark hair was parted on the side and combed straight back. He looked very much like a movie star from the 1940's. At 5'8", he had a sturdy build and piercing dark eyes. I swear he could look straight into your soul. At the same time, he appeared to be sizing up each player. You could almost hear the inner workings of his mind say:

> He looks fast. Definitely a lineman. Great eye contact. Big hands. Probably an end. I'm sure that one's a freshman but he'll grow.

He took thoughtful puffs on his everpresent pipe. On rainy days he would pack and puff that thing up-side down. Truly miraculous! When he moved, you just knew he was powerful and quick, like a stalking panther. He was singularly



responsible for securing all of the college football gear for the Prep.

He spoke about dedication, loyalty and teamwork and about how he was going to mold us into a winning team. He was straightforward and blended sarcasm with a few off color words. This was in stark contrast to the Jesuit exchanges we listened to daily in class. Their job was to mold our minds, hearts and souls. His was to make us a winning football team. To us, he was Coach or Mr. Ososki. Never Sammy! He was tough and a strict task master. His knowledge of the game was second to none. Every play was scripted, measured and exact. You couldn't dog it out there in

practice or you'd have to run that play over and over again until you got it right. And then do it again and again. He pushed us to our limits and beyond. He made us hurt, but he made us so much better. We were never unprepared for any game and Coach Ososki made sure that we knew everything about our foes on the field; right down to their girlfriend's names. Game preparations, as well as an analysis of game performances, rivaled those in the NFL. All of our home games were filmed. The 16 mm tapes did not lie and you couldn't hide.

Mr. Ososki was more than a coach. He was a second father. Football games were personal. He had an uncanny way of

making it seem that the opponent was trying to defeat us just to spite him. We railed against that. His pregame and halftime speeches were right out of Hollywood scripts. He could take that pipe and hold it in such a way to make the smoke cause his eyes to water. You didn't have to know what he was saying. All you needed to motivate yourself was to see your "father" with tears in his eyes because of the other team.

I look back on my high school time and the years I played for Coach Ososki and they were so very special. My sophomore and senior years were (and remain to this day) the Prep's only undefeated seasons. I didn't get the full flavor in my sophomore year because an illness curtailed my playing in September. However, in my senior year I relished it. I learned so much about life from Coach Ososki. Those special pearls can be summed up as: Be prepared. Don't look for short-cuts. Anything done should be done well. Be a team player. Always be loyal. And when you score, don't rub it in and make it look like you've been there before.

I graduated high school, entered college, worked my entire life and lived those lessons. I hope that this student became half the teacher they were.

Coach Ososki is now gone. I still hold his memories and lessons close. Over time, I've attended reunions and maintained close relationships with my high school classmates. When Coach Ososki was able to attend some of those gatherings, I got the chance to sit next to him and even called him Sammy! What a thrill! When reminiscing with my old classmates, it is truly remarkable how our conversation eventually drifts to Sammy Ososki, his lessons of life and how much we miss him.

Sophomore Dream Day 2011

On Friday, May 13th, the sophomores entered the theater at 8:30 a.m. with a mixture of curiosity and anticipation. What they knew of the day was that they were allowed to wear jeans and sneakers, they were not going to be attending classes and they were going to be given a free lunch. In other words, the day was looking really good before it even started.

They were also aware that this day, Sophomore Dream Day 2011, was the culmination of various themes that have been explored in group guidance class throughout the academic year. Themes such as the importance of seeking inspiration as well as being an inspiration to others, and the critical task of cultivating a life of purpose by identifying one's strengths, values, goals and resources. The day was opened with a welcome from the Guidance and Counseling department which offer this full-day program annually. In addition to the showing of the moving and highly praised film, Goal! The Dream Begins and a pizza lunch provided by the Mother's Club, two student acts were part of the day's agenda. In the morning, Fordham Prep senior, Troy Krusz, played two songs on his guitar and in the afternoon, junior, Jeff Limoncelli, performed a magic trick on stage. Both students talked to the sophomores about how they are currently pursuing their

passions of music and performing magic.

To end the day's program was keynote speaker Joseph Bastianich, Fordham Prep class of 1985. Joe was a local boy who grew up working in his parent's Italian restaurant in Queens. After attending the Prep and college, Joe pursued a career on Wall Street, but left it in short order to pursue his passions of food and wine. Joe shared with the students how his perception of what it meant to be successful and happy changed over time and how he has never had any regrets about pursuing that which was most meaningful to him. Enthralled by his story,

Rowing Team Nationally Ranked

The Varsity Coxed 4 boat competed in the Youth National Regatta held in Oak Ridge, Tennessee in early June where they placed 5th. The crew placed 2nd in the Scholastic National Regatta held in Camden, New Jersey over Memorial Day Weekend. A realization of goals formed 4 years ago by freshmen that had never rowed before they joined the FP Crew team.

Fordham Prep Crew team originally started in 1915 by John J. Mulcahy (Fordham Prep 1891 & FU 1894). At the 1904 Olympics Mulcahy won the Gold Medal in the "double scull" and the Silver Medal in the "coxed pair". The year 2000 heralded the resurgence of a pedigreed crew team to Fordham Prep when a group of fathers and 11 students worked tirelessly to revive the sport. Four years later the team really took off winning gold and silver at the 2004 NYS Championship Regatta.

Over the past 10 years interest in the sport has grown immeasurably and the team doubled its members in the last two years. Crew continues to become more competitive due to the dedication of the athletes, the Prep Administration, Coach Giacobbe and the undying and energetic family support. 113 students tried out for crew in the spring of 2011, marking the first year that the Fordham Prep crew team made cuts. Coach Giacobbe instituted a 20 person Development team that trained daily at the Lombardi Center and a 50 rower competition team.

2011 proved to be a fantastic year for the Rowing Rams. With FP Athletics and Administration firmly behind the team and Coach Giacobbe training the




returning Novice, JV and Varsity members through the winter, they began the racing season with a hale and hearty travelling team. Additionally, several members of the team were named Scholar Athletes this spring by the NY State Scholastic Rowing Association which recognize scholar athletes who maintain an academic average of 90% or better while participating in the most challenging sport of them all.

Regattas began in April and the Novice and JV 8+ crews were placing solidly in the top 25% of their races. The Novice 8+ won the Gold medal in Saratoga Springs and are the 2011 NYS Champions! The families and team went WILD as the Novice crew crossed the finish line in first place! The JV4+ crew came together, earning silver at the NYS Championship Regatta and the gold at Long Island Junior Championship Regatta in Oyster Bay. This crew rowed valiantly at the Stotesbury Cup and the Scholastic National Regatta. The Varsity Coxed 4 had a goal, to row

at the Youth National Regatta. Their 2nd place finish at Saratoga sealed the Scholastic National and Youth National Regatta entries and last week they made Rowing Rams history by becoming the first Prep crew to make the A Finals at the 2011 Youth National Regatta. Physically, the smallest crew in the A Finals, they earned 5th place in the Nation behind crews who row 3 or 4 seasons to our 1 season. This was no small feat! Thanks to Coach Giacobbe for his vision and the incredible number of hours he has devoted to the team.



Prep History

Considering that Fordham Prep had already celebrated its golden jubilee nearly a decade before the 19th century would draw to a close, it is not surprising that the early 21st century has seen (and will continue to see) a number of significant anniversaries for some of the Prep's most time-honored traditions. Prep football, for instance, will mark its 125th year in 2012, having begun its legacy in 1887 with that legendary scoreless game against Xavier that was called on account of darkness. Just this past year, Prep baseball celebrated its historic 150th, and come September 2013, the Aqua Rams will observe their centennial as an official team sport. (Of course, recreational Prep swimming dates back even 72 years further, when Prep boys would first head to the Second Division



Swimming Hole down on the Bronx River.) Not only swimming, but Prep theater will also reach a 100-year milestone in 2013, with the commemoration of the April 1913 production of *M. Balmer*, the first distinct Fordham Prep show.

This coming September 19th, any student so unlucky as to bring walking jug on himself will have the distinct "honor" of making his punitory perambulation on the 90th anniversary of walking jug, instituted by none other than Fr. Arthur Shea, S.J. (then still a scholastic), legendary Prep Prefect of Discipline. And by the way, no use trying to calculate a founding date for the concept of jug itself — as an anonymous student from 1886 reminds us, "It is immortal."

Athletics, dramatics and disciplinary practices aside, even an institution as mundane as the Prep Lost-and-Found can boast of its venerability, founded in 1888 as the Holy Childhood Book Pound (for Wayward Tomes and Articles) by Joseph Faye, Class of 1889. Incidentally, Faye's fee for reuniting an item with its owner was one penny — ostensibly for charity, though it is difficult to say how many of those pennies actually found their way into the poorbox and how many wound up as Joe's sarsaparilla money. With the Holy Childhood Book Pound's 125th anniversary only two years away, we can certainly appreciate that a sense of humor has been part of the Prep tradition from the very beginning.

But perhaps one of the most unexpected dates from our history books is the 1908 founding of what is today called the Fordham Prep Aviation Club. It is remarkable to think that just five years after Kitty Hawk, would-be Prep pilots were already visiting plane shows and spending time at the airport. And just what airport could they possibly have been visiting in 1908? The very first one, of course, which conveniently happened to be right here in the Bronx.

Most readers will probably recognize Morris Park as the name of the tree-lined, residential Bronx neighborhood and its main thoroughfare. Some may even know that before the area was built up, it was the site of the Morris Park Racecourse, host of both the Preakness and Belmont Stakes in the late 19th and early 20th centuries. What is often forgotten, however, is that in 1908, the track was taken over by the New York Aeronautical Society, creating what is considered by some historians to be the first public airport in the country. In what would be the original incarnation of the Aviation Club, Prep students would make the $2\frac{1}{2}$ mile walk to watch the various early plane exhibits. Over the next few years, with World War I just beyond the horizon, those first Fordham aerophiles would watch aviation technology take off. Suddenly, the sky was the limit.

Housed in the Prep Archives is an original copy of *Aerial Age Magazine* dating back to the war years, perhaps the confiscated extracurricular reading of a sky-minded student from nearly a century ago. There are also clippings from wartime issues of the *Fordham Ram* (in those days as much the Prep's newspaper as the College's) — ads for Eagle Aviation School with its Farmingdale, Long Island airfield. After all, as the ad reads, "Aviation is the industry of today!"

On a somber note, though we do not know if he was on one of those jaunts to the Morris Park Aerodrome, we do know that Walter Thompson, a Prep student around 1910, was a U.S. Naval Aviator in World War I and that he died serving his country in September of 1918. A second air casualty of the war was John Purroy Mitchel, Class of 1894, who had actually been Mayor of New York City from 1914 through 1918 before embarking on his tragically short military career. After his term in office — an administration remembered as one of governmental responsibility and reform — Mitchel would enlist in the Army Air Corps at age 39. Shortly afterwards, on July 6, 1918, Capt. Mitchel would perish on a training mission. The now-decommissioned Mitchel Air Force Base out in Hempstead was named in his memory, where in fact, years later, alum and now-retired faculty member, Dr. Frank Holbrook '45, would be

stationed by the Air Force in 1952 as Air Police Adjutant.

During World War II, a Prep organization for students interested in aeronautics was born once again, this time as a subset of the Industrial Arts Club. Dedicated and patriotic, these aviation buffs would lend their talents to the war effort, creating model aircraft that were actually used by the military for training purposes. Many alums would see combat during the Second World War — flyboys among them — including Air Force pilot Jerry Boyle '39, graphic artist Robert Leydenfrost '43 who flew missions aboard B-17 Flying Fortresses, and Col. John "Jack" Fischer '32, a decorated fighter pilot who was shot down over Germany in 1944, bailed out of his burning plane, and spent 15 months as a POW. (As his daughter tells the story, upon

his liberation, he immediately jumped into a borrowed plane, flew to Belgium, and proposed to Red Cross worker Eleanor Donohue.) There were also a good number of Fordham men who would make the ultimate sacrifice in Europe or in the Pacific. Among them was Pilot Officer Robert F. Minnick, Class of 1937, a member of the Royal Canadian Air Force, who died in Scotland in 1940 before the United States had even entered the war. Minnick had always been an adventurous soul (he was nearly expelled from the Prep when he was caught taking an unauthorized tour of Keating Hall while it was still under construction) and so, before America's involvement in World War II was even decided, Minnick plotted his own course of action and set off for Canada to take a stand against the atrocities overseas.

The Korean War would also see Prep alums take to the skies. Among them was Army pilot Joseph McCarthy '48 who flew aerial missions during the war and afterwards would fly recreationally as a licensed glider pilot. Robert Gomprecht, M.D. '41 (father of the current Prep principal) served as a flight surgeon and an instructor of aviation medicine on Gunter Air Force Base, and Col. Jack Fischer would fly once again, both on reconnaissance and humanitarian missions, helping to establish Catholic orphanages for the children of the war-torn region. In addition to the Purple Heart and Air Medal he received for his service in WWII, Fischer was also awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross, the Bronze Star Medal and two Air Medals for his efforts during the Korean War.

As American involvement grew in Vietnam during the '60s, once again Prepmen would be called into service, including aviator alums such as Donald O'Connor '59, who flew with the Marine Corps. And among the many casualties of the war was Prep Hall of Honor inductee Maj. Eugene Pabst '60 whose aircraft went down over Vietnam on October 7, 1966. On the homefront, the 1960's would mark the arrival of Mr. Arthur McCormack on the Fordham Prep faculty after a full career at Eastern Airlines. Ever the inimitable raconteur, McCormack would make certain that tales of the wild blue yonder would be part of Prep consciousness for years to come.

Nearly four decades later, with McCormack as his mentor and inspiration, Mr. Raymond González of the Science Department would obtain his light sport pilot license and once again resurrect the Fordham Prep Aviation Club in 2006, adding video simulators and remote control aircraft to the long history of the Prep's fascination with flight. The club was featured this past spring on MSG Varsity's *High School Journal*. Recent members have included Anthony Zerafa '07, Miguel Hummel '10, Philip Truong '10 (Prep diving record holder), and Garrett Gowan '13. It is worth noting that Dr. Martin Carney of the Religion Department, as well as Cameron Granda '12, Daniel Lee '12, and Daniel Golden '12 are all considered honorary Aviation Club members, as eyewitnesses of US Airways Flight 1549 — Sullenberger's "Miracle on the Hudson" — as it tumbled through the skies over the Bronx. The footage they captured on their cellphones was used by local newscasts.

From among the alumni of this 21st-century incarnation of the Aviation Club, Anthony Zerafa is already a licensed pilot.
