Chaplain's Corner: LENT

Having taught for many years, I know that most teachers are very happy if they learn that their former students remember enough to quote them (hopefully, somewhat accurately). During my theological studies, Fr. Walter Burghardt was one of my instructors. I'm not sure how much of what appears below is my own and how much Fr. Burghardt's. So be it.

This Lent, if you want to share in the dying/rising of Jesus, skip the latest diet fad, forget the carrots, yogurt and cottage cheese, the apple and diet Coke. Simply listen! To listen is to risk. It can take precious time, often when we feel we can least afford it. Be open to your children, your spouse, your co-workers, your neighbor. This can open you to others' problems when you have enough of your own. Real listening is an act of love, even when people "dump" on you because they know you are a good listener. Listening is wonderfully human, splendidly Christian, almost divine.


During Lent, we are challenged to give up our lust for things, our acquired need for absolute security and unbounded comfort and luxury. There are no luggage racks in a hearse. Let go of the passion for power over others, the desire to bend them to do your will. Jesus

was tempted to use His power for Himself and His own needs as we are reminded the first Sunday of every Lent. Fortunately, He had the wisdom and the courage to say: "Get behind me, Satan!"

For Lent, give up self-absorption where you take yourself too seriously, when the days and nights rotate around YOU, your blood pressure and your hiatal hernia, your successes and your failures. For an asceticism of humor, you must distance yourself from yourself, see yourself in perspective, as you really are. You are a bundle of contradictions, a paradox. You hope and despair, act manic and depressive, love and hate, sometimes feel bad about feeling good, occasionally feel guilty if you don't feel guilty.

Whether it's turning 40 or 65, whether it's family problems or a nursing home or forced retirement whatever the imprisoning situation, I can feel not only different but diminished. I can be tempted to hark back to my glory days - remember when? Let the past be past. As Jesus shows us after the crucifixion, the best is yet to come. Dare to hope and to dream.

Too many Christians are unable to accept Christ's Good News, His forgiveness. They wallow in guilt, are



terrified of hell, are tormented by past offenses. Not for this did God become one of us. Fix your eyes not on yesterday's sin but on today's forgiveness and healing. If you are searching for some meaningful selfdenial this Lent, stop looking back. Let God be God and do not be afraid.



Fordham Prep Presents at the Ignatian Family Teach-In held at Georgetown University

This past November over 1,200 students from Jesuit colleges and high schools across the country gathered at Georgetown University to participate in the annual Ignatian Family Teach-In, sponsored by the Ignatian Solidarity Network. 18 students and two faculty from Fordham Prep joined the contingent and participated in reflecting on this year's theme inspired by the words of Fr. Peter Hans-Kolvenbach, S.J., past Superior General of the Society. Fr. Kolvenbach, in his October 2000 address at Santa Clara University on "The Service of Faith and the Promotion of Justice in American Jesuit Higher Education," stated: "Students must let the gritty reality of this world into their lives, so they can learn to feel it, think about it critically, respond to its suffering and engage it constructively. They should learn to perceive, think, judge, choose and act for the rights of others, especially the disadvantaged and the oppressed. Students need close involvement with the poor and the marginal now, in order to learn about reality and become adults of solidarity in

The students from the Prep joined students from across the country in reflecting and strategizing on the "gritty reality" in their own lives, and the ways in which they can engage it. In addition, senior Dennis Kennelly

also presented to the entire assembly on how Fordham Prep has actively engaged the gritty reality by sharing Fordham Prep's efforts regarding environmental sustainability. With the help of a video documentary created by Biology teacher, Pierre Chavez, Dennis presented footage of the Prep's first-ever garbage audit, the results of which were earlier shared with the Prep community at the annual school-wide social justice assembly. Dennis shared how the results of the audit inspired the Prep community to better reduce, reuse, and recycle which led to the placement of recycling containers throughout the building. Since then, Fordham Prep's Just Serve Club, the action arm of the Prep's Social Justice Committee, has partnered with the NY Botanical Gardens and has assisted their composting program by volunteering at local urban community gardens. They hope to bring their new found knowledge and experience to augment the Prep's current composting efforts and grow some vegetables in the Prep's Green House which will then be donated to local soup kitchens.

This year's Social Justice Assembly on March 1 focused on domestic poverty with an eye toward increasing understanding, raising consciousness, and engaging in some poverty reduction programs.




With the advent of spring, I look forward to seeing many of you at the five-year reunions ahead.

The Principal's Report

It is no big deal to say we are all aware that the world is becoming increasingly interconnected. Recently, I needed to contact the father of a Prep student to discuss his son. I dialed his cell phone and he answered the call while having lunch in China. Communication systems are connecting us in unprecedented ways. The global economy has been made evident by recent economic issues in Europe and their impact around the world. And the Internet allows communication and sharing of staggering amounts of information (and misinformation) at any moment of any day.

All this creates a growing need to prepare our students to actively engage the world, and this need is supported by Father General Adolfo Nicolas, S.J. Jesuit schools must answer the call set forth to Jesuit educators in General Congregation 35.

"Serving Christ's mission today means paying special attention to its global context. This context requires us to act as a universal body with a universal mission, realizing at the same time the radical diversity of our situations. It is as a worldwide community – and, simultaneously, as a network of local communities – that we seek to serve others across the world."

Fordham Prep and other Jesuit high schools are spending a lot of time on strategic planning to find ways to prepare our students for this world. It is a complex job. We certainly need to think in terms of structures within the Prep which will be needed to achieve this goal. We also need to develop within our students a global way of looking at problems. And when our students view world events such as the European economic crisis, or the recent banking disaster in our country, or Hurricane Katrina which devastated New Orleans, or the potential development of nuclear weapons in Iran, or Jeremy Lin revitalizing the Knicks and triggering the development of an entire new vocabulary – Lincredible, we want them to piece together the global implications.

We are constantly working on ways to accomplish this. A reliable, advanced system of technology is certainly among the tools our students must learn to use. As a result, technology upgrades have become big-ticket items at the Prep. We spent several years on a major curriculum review which has been described in earlier editions of *Ramview*. As part of that effort, teachers developed global connections within their courses. Several years ago, we added Mandarin to the list of languages we teach at the Prep. The program has grown into a three-year sequence. During the upcoming academic year, we plan to continue to focus these efforts. We will offer Arabic I to next year's sophomores, juniors and seniors. As with Mandarin, we intend the program to develop into a three-year sequence.

This coming summer, Boston College High School will host the first ever International Colloquium on Jesuit Secondary Education (ICJSE). By gathering as a global network of Jesuit schools for the very first time, we will begin to work collectively to best prepare not only our students, but ourselves as educators to truly become global citizens. We will address common challenges, share resources and strengthen our educational network while we strive to maintain our Jesuit identity. Over 200 Jesuit secondary schools and institutions from around the world will be in attendance. Our President, Father Ken Boller, S.J., and I will represent Fordham Prep. I'm sure we will have much to share with you after the Colloquium this July.

Fordham Prep and our other Jesuit schools are dedicated to forming the next generation of leaders in the world. This will require preparing students to think globally, working collaboratively as a network of schools, and exchanging ideas, strategies and practices. We probably will always be working towards these goals, but we are certainly off to a good start.












Prep History



What's in a Name?

Once upon a time, more than half a century before the Bronx would become a borough, a man named John, who just happened to have been born on Midsummer's Day, the Feast of the Nativity of St. John the Baptist, decided to found a school in the village of Fordham. He chose St. John's Day (his own 44th birthday) as the day to mark its official opening – a gesture of devotion to his heavenly patron. The man, of course, was the Most Reverend John Hughes, Bishop (and later Archbishop) of New York. And when he named his school, surely His Grace (as he would have been called) surprised few. Thus Fordham Prep and University were born together as St. John's College in Fordham, New York on June

To Hughes' credit, *St. John's* was a fine name, and a popular one at that, with several homonymous schools, hospitals, and churches across the area, Catholic and non-Catholic alike. Early on, it became convenient to use the epithet *Fordham* when referring to the school in order to distinguish it from other organizations of the same name. After the Vincentians opened St. John's University in 1870 (originally in Brooklyn, now in Queens), the St. John's part was dropped more and more frequently, even in the media. Soon enough, for the sake of clarity, the place became known simply by

the long-held name of its village: Fordham.

The name Fordham had been on the map for over a century and a half before the land was even purchased by "Dagger John" (Hughes' nickname on account of his custom of preceding his signature with a cross, or dagger, and also on account of His Grace's [ahem] resolve). It had been named by Jan Arcer, later Anglicized to John Archer, a Dutchman who would come to own a large tract of land between the Harlem and Bronx Rivers. At a ford by the Spuyten Duyvil Creek, he established a settlement and called it "the hamlet by the ford," or in a word, "Fordham" - a name that would be given to the whole of his estate. There is another less accepted version of the story that suggests it was John's wife, Catherine Charles Archer, who named the place after the ancient village of Fordham near her ancestral home in Cambridge, England. In either case, it was from the Archers' manor that the village would take it name, and from the village, in turn, the school. As for the other toponym associated with the Fordham campus, Rose Hill, well, that is another story altogether, involving a consanguineous marriage, General George Washington, and the ghost of Mary, Queen of Scots. [No, seriously!] Perhaps it is best to save that one for a column

In 1907, St. John's College would petition the State for a change in its charter, officially becoming Fordham University. As for Second Division (in other words the Prep), the name Fordham Prep had been used with regularity since around the turn of the century, even appearing on athletic uniforms starting in 1904. Nonetheless, with the charter change, the school's legal name became St. John's College High School. Throughout the early 20th century, some documents bear one name, some the other, and some, both. Finally, as late as 1937, under the principalship of the Rev. Adrian Bona, S.J., a meeting was held at which the school's identity crisis was finally resolved, and Fordham Prep was once and for all Fordham Prep.

Now while all this arcane
Fordhamensic rambling is fascinating, we all know that what makes really
Fordham Prep Fordham Prep has nothing to do with the naming conventions of a 17th-century landlord (who apparently was none too loved by his tenants, at that). What makes Fordham Prep Fordham
Prep is its people, most especially the thousands of young men who have called it their second home for the past 171
years. Just these past few semesters – in coordination with the Administration's and Alumni Office's creation of Alumni
Hall where hang the yearbook portraits

of Prep alums since 1928 - the Archivist's Office has undertaken the task of recompiling rosters for all Prep grads dating back to 1846 (the first Commencement at Rose Hill). It seems that on New Year's Eve of 1924, a fire broke out in the Administration Building of the University where Prep and University records alike were kept in those days. Attempting to save what paperwork he could, the Rev. Michael Jessup, S.J. was burned in that fire, the same Fr. Jessup who had been a Prep Algebra teacher in 1899, as well as the 30th, 5th, 1st, or 0th [sic] principal of Fordham Prep, depending on how one counts. [Yup, that'll eventually need its own column, too.] And so, pieced together from tuition ledgers, school catalogs, newspaper clippings, old photographs, and Fr. Jessup's salvaged "Fire Files," for the first time since before the Great Depression, the Prep's alumni registry is more or less complete – with a surprising number of 19th-century portraits to boot. (They too will be up on the walls of Alumni Hall before too long.) With all the rosters now in place, the following is a glimpse into how that roll call of Prepsters

If somehow all Prep alums from the very beginning were made to stand alphabetically in single file, that line would stretch just about five miles, from the school's front door to City Island.

Prep History

At the head of that line would be Alfred Abate, Class of 1969. Half a borough away would be his predecessor by a century, Joseph Zwinge, S.J., Class of 1869, who, in 1890, as a member of the Administration, would oversee the transfer of the small College Cemetery from its original location near the Bronx River to its site just across Bellarmine Road from the Prep today. Keeping Zwinge company would be the Zutells, Robert and Raymond, Classes of 1940 and 1946; Henry Zurmhellen, Class of 1905; Miguel Zuricaldy, Class of 1895; and the Zurhellen boys, Thomas and J. Owen, Classes of 1987 and '84 respectively.

To our Founder's satisfaction, the most common given name on the line would be John: 1,557 including hyphenated and non-hyphenated compounds. Of course, etymologically, we should probably include the 10 *Jon*s and 5 *Jon*-based double names; the 13 forms of *Jean*; the 18 *Juans* and 2 Joans (a Catalan spelling); the 8 Giovannis, 6 Gians, and 1 Gianni; 109 Seans, Seáns, Shanes, Shauns, Shawns and Sheans; the 11 Evans and 1 Evin; a dozen Jacks and a Jac; the 10 Ivans and 1 Ivo; 6 Ians; 6 Hanses; 2 variations of Jan; the singular Jenik, a Yohannes, and (depending how they derive their names) possibly Jonas Bender-Nash, Class of 2001; Yhancy Nuñez, Class of 2000; Jantzen Rodriguez, Class of 1993; and Zane Rodriguez, Class of 1952, bringing the grand total to 1,785 - more than 10% of all Prep alumni.

As for the rarest group of names on the line: first names beginning with *X*. In 171 years, the Prep has managed to graduate only one: Xaralambos Papadatos, Class of 2010 – and technically, his *X* is really a Greek chi. No shortage of middle names starting with *X* though. Befitting our Jesuit tradition, Xavier is a middle name of some frequency, especially among Francises. First example: Francis Xavier Hennings, Class of 1867; most recent: Christian Xavier Wright, Class of 2011.

The alum with the most memorable alliterative appellation of them all has to be Harry Hamburger, Class of 1911, captain and quarterback of the Prep's undefeated 1910 championship team. Incidentally, he received quite the write-up in the *Times* when he joined the University squad in 1912. It seems that good ol' Harry has a knack for getting his name in print once every hundred years like clockwork [Makes a note for 2112].

If attendance were to be taken along this imaginary eight-kilometer queue between Abate and Zwinge, one would find names of various description, representing the ethnic backgrounds of the Prep's 17,151 alums to date. Even without counting up the Croatians and tallying the Trinidadians, certain demographic trends would clearly emerge, reflecting not only the evolution of the Prep from a division of St. John's College into a high school unto itself, but also, changes in the population of Greater New York at large. While there has been a definite Irish presence at Rose Hill from the very beginning, at points during the 1800s it would have been rivaled in number by names of French and Spanish descent, as so many of the boarding students were coming from places like Canada, Haiti, Mexico, Puerto Rico, Cuba, the Dominican Republic, and Ecuador. This would change around 1900, as the Prep began to accept fewer boarders and more local boys, until finally, in 1920, the Prep would end its boarding school days altogether and became the day school we

One indicator of these changes would be the increase of the number of Italian

names just after World War I. Barely a handful find their way onto the rosters before the Prep's 75th anniversary in 1916, Starting around 1920, however, these numbers take off and continue to grow over the next thirty years. Asian names begin to appear on the rosters in the mid-20th century, mostly Korean and Chinese, and approaching the new millennium, Albanian names become noticeably frequent.

Other demographic trends would be far more steady and long-lasting, such as the appreciable stream of German and Polish names that runs decade after decade from the 1840s right down through today. Moreover, the whole of the Prep's onomasticon is punctuated fairly regularly by the occasional Greek or Dutch name, the former more so among the 1900s and millennial boys; the latter, among those from Fordham's earlier days. Of course, for those simply interested in keeping up with the Joneses, there have been nineteen to date, starting with Francis Jones, Class of 1873. The twentieth will be joining them this June: Dylan Jones, Class of 2012.

Now when it came time for writing

out the obligatory "Hello, My Name Is" stickers for this thought experiment of a reunion, [one wonders how impressed some of those 19th-century boys would be by Sharpies and self-adhesives] our tireless scrivener would most certainly find it harder to fit some names on those tags than others. Among the easiest fits (beating out even the monosyllabic Yips and Lees, Days and Mays and Coxes and Foxes) would be the two-letter men, all 19 of them: Samuel Jo, 2009; Anthony Go, 1993; Duong Ly, 1992; Heng Ly, 1988; Quang Ly, 1991; Arnold Ng, 2006; Chung Ng, 1972; Edward Ng, 1977; James Ng, 1981; Jon-Stephen Ng, 2005; Eugene Oh, 1993; Thuat To, 2003; Thuyet To, 2006; Shawn Christopher Uy, 2011; Binh Vu, 2003; Jack Wu, 1960; Robin Wu, 1960; David Ye, 2001 and Raymond Yu, 1999. At the other end of the spectrum, in all their tetrakaidekagrammatic splendor, would be the alums with fourteenletter, non-hyphenated surnames: Anatasios Christoforatos, 1998; Fernando Ibargüengoitia, 1870; Christopher Mastrovincenzo, 1996; Victor Mastrovincenzo, 1966; Carl Reichenwallner, 1942; and Rudolph Schellenberger, 1945.

But longest of all, outlettering even most of the compound names (the longest of those belongs to Edwin Almanzar-DePasquale, Class of 2003), is the fifteenlettered Robert Zachariasiewicz, Class of 1964, for whom kindergarten must have been harder than grad school. Though unverifiable, it seems safe to say that Robert probably held the Prep record for most mispronounced name during that first roll call of Orientation, or Schola Brevis as it was known - at least until September of 2010. That was the year when Michael Dmytryshyn III entered as a freshman. When Mike joins the ranks of the alumni in 2014, he will be the one with the longest name without an A, E, I, O, or U, and *Dmytryshyn* will be the only name (first or last) with 3 Ys – two records not likely to be shattered soon, not even by the time the line reaches the Larchmont border, which should be just about when the next Harry Hamburger article goes to press.


In the last issue of Ramview, we traced the history of the Prep ring back to the 1920s, putting out a call for any rings dating back even further. Well, within a few days, that call was answered by Prep parent Anne Goswami, mother of Blaise Goswami '01. Mrs. Goswami is not only a Prep parent, but a Prep granddaughter as well. Her grandfather, John Karl, was a member of the Class of 1913 and the proud owner and wearer of what has to be one of the earliest Prep rings out there. Our sincerest thanks to the Karls and Goswamis for sharing their stories and their legacy ring with us, and for helping us to recapture this lost bit of Prep history as we approach the centennial of John's graduation.

John Michael Karl, Class of 1913, was born in New York City on April 2, 1895, the fourth son of German immigrants. The family lived in the Harlem section of upper Manhattan. John attended Our Lady of the Angels grade school before entering Fordham Prep in 1909. After his Prep days, John attended New York University and studied accounting. In his senior year of college, John was drafted into the US Army and served with the Military Police in WWI the-

atres in France and Germany. He was awarded his BS Commerce degree in Accounting in absentia in 1918. After his discharge in 1919, John returned to New York and became a public accountant in the firm Lautenbacker & Karl. In 1926 he began his law studies at night at Fordham University, receiving his LLB in June, 1929. John remained a lawyer in private practice until his death on January 6, 1965.




